# C. Computer Information Systems A.A.S. Degree; Fall 2018

The department will modify the CIS A.A.S. degree to be a generic CIS A.A.S. degree and 3 specific optional tracks. Students will be able to choose to complete the generic degree without tracks or one or more tracks. The 3 distinct optional tracks will be:

- 1. Programming and Database Management Systems
- 2. Web design and Programming
- 3. System and Network Administration

#### D. Computer Information Systems A.S. Degree; Fall 2018

The department will increase the number of courses requiring a "C" or better in this curriculum and proposes a Computer Science track to specify and accommodate the SUNY Computer Science Transfer Pathway. This track will discretely specify the more select higher level required courses and permissible elective to satisfy the SUNY Computer Science transfer Pathway and Computer Science curriculums throughout the country.

#### 4. Deactivation and Discontinuance:

#### A. Business Marketing A.A.S.—Retail Option; Fall 2018

This deactivation/discontinuance is based on the lack of enrollment over the past several years and the consolidation of the Marketing programs into one degree offering.

#### B. Computer Information Systems: Systems and Network Administration A.A.S. Degree; Fall 2018

The creation of tracks within the single CIS A.A.S. degree will provide students with an equivalent curriculum. This deactivation/discontinuance reflects the department's intent to provide a more flexible generic CIS degree that can be tailored to students' identified outcomes replacing the need for this specific degree.

#### C. Computer Information Systems: Web Design and WWW Programming A.A.S. Degree; Fall 2018

This degree will be replaced by a Web Design and Programming track within the CIS A.A.S. program. This deactivation/discontinuance reflects the department's intent to provide a more flexible generic CIS degree that can be tailored to students' identified outcomes replacing the need for this specific degree.
